MEETING THE NEEDS OF A GROWING POPULATION



THE CITY OF WANNEROO RECENTLY ADOPTED ITS 2008/09 BUDGET AND WILL INVEST APPROXIMATELY \$94 MILLION* IN THE COMMUNITY OVER THE NEXT 12 MONTHS.

"The City of Wanneroo's population is expected to nearly double by the year 2021. With such a rapidly expanding population it is essential that we deliver the necessary infrastructure to cater for the growing community's needs. This year's budget is focused on the completion of the most significant major capital works projects the City has ever undertaken including the

construction of the new Wanneroo Library and Cultural Centre, the revitalisation of Wanneroo Aquamotion and the Children's Innovative Playspace. The investments we make today will ensure the sustainability of our future," Mayor Jon Kelly said. *Continued page 3*

MAYOR'S MESSAGE

THE CITY OF WANNEROO'S COMMITMENT TO MEET THE NEEDS OF OUR RAPIDLY GROWING COMMUNITY IS EVIDENT IN THE 2008/09 BUDGET.

With \$50 million being invested in this year's budget combined with almost \$44 million carried over from the 2007/08 Budget, the City's capital works program is still one of the largest for a local government.

Over the next 12 months residents will see the results of the significant investments the City has made over the past nine years. Council has revitalised the heart of our City with major developments including the Wanneroo Library and Cultural Centre, Wanneroo Aquamotion and the private sector investment in the Wanneroo Central Shopping Centre in the Wanneroo town centre.

Our long term approach to responsible financial management of our City's budget has been the key to meeting our challenges and ensuring the sustainable growth of the region.

The 2008/09 Budget will see a further \$16 million allocated to major road way extensions and upgrades, \$36 million to infrastructural projects, and \$60,000 for a feasibility study into the development of a new multicultural facility in the Girrawheen/Koondoola area.

Along with newly improved facilities such as Kingsway Indoor Stadium and Yanchep Library, we will expand on our extensive range of community programs including free community events and programs for seniors.

We are committed to creating a sustainable environment with the rollout of the new universal recycling bins and bin collection service for all households in the City of Wanneroo and are working with the community to reduce greenhouse gas emissions with our Energy Action Plan.

Of course, this time of the year also marks the increase in rates payments to our residents. As a ratepayer with both commercial and residential property in the City of Wanneroo, I understand the dreaded feeling that accompanies the receipt of your rates notices.

It is important to understand that your rates add value to the community while ensuring a vibrant future. For every dollar you pay in rates, council puts two dollars back into the community.

Through responsible financial management we have managed to maintain one of the lowest rating councils in the metro area with the average rate per residential house rising of 7.9 per cent (inclusive of the standard rubbish charge).

From revitalising our community spaces, to completing key capital works projects and improving our well renowned community services, I am proud to say the 2008/09 Budget reflects the smart investments we have made over the years that honour both our civic and cultural heritage and future sustainability.

OUR MULTICULTURAL CITY

THE CITY OF WANNEROO HAS A RICH CULTURAL DIVERSITY WITH 72 PER CENT OF THE POPULATION HAVING BEEN BORN OVERSEAS. IN ADDITION TO THOSE OF ENGLISH DESCENT, MANY RESIDENTS HAVE MIGRATED HERE FROM COUNTRIES INCLUDING ITALY, SOUTH AFRICA, NEW ZEALAND AND VIETNAM.

The City of Wanneroo is committed to supporting its multicultural society with \$60,000 being allocated in this year's budget to conduct a feasibility study into the construction of a new multicultural facility in the Girrawheen/Koondoola area.

The study will be conducted over the coming months and will involve comprehensive consultation with multicultural groups living in the region to determine factors such as size and scope of the building and what facilities the centre would need.

The purpose of the centre will be to celebrate the City's cultural diversity, share experiences and attract support to enhance the current wellbeing and future direction of the City's multicultural communities.

SUPPORTING LOCAL BUSINESS AND GROWTH

FROM THE EARLY DAYS OF SETTLEMENT, WANNEROO HAS ATTRACTED RESIDENTS TO AN AFFORDABLE OCEAN LIFESTYLE, AS WELL AS BOASTING A VIBRANT MIX OF INDUSTRIES AND EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES.

Identified as the fastest growing local government in Western Australia and the second fastest in Australia, the City of Wanneroo is faced with managing its sustainability while meeting a high demand for infrastructure, industrial and residential land and population growth.

"Our City's rapid growth presents the challenge of meeting our ever growing community's needs and expectations through the provision of quality infrastructure while ensuring our City's environmental and economic sustainability," Mayor Jon Kelly said. "This requires sound financial management and implementation of smart, cost effective initiatives that serve to support the achievement of the City's strategic goals."

"The City is committed to supporting new and existing businesses by focusing on developing local employment and attracting new businesses to the region while supporting existing businesses' growth and success."

The expansion of the Wangara and Landsdale Industrial Estates developments and the future development of the world-class industrial estate, Meridian Park in Neerabup, will create more than 20,000 new jobs as well as provide a vital injection into our local, regional and state economies. Additionally, the Yanchep/Two Rocks area is targeting 50,000 new employment opportunities by 2025.

In 1978, Trevor Johnson OAM and his family started Crown Mushrooms, having identified limited varieties and high prices in the Western Australian mushroom market. Thirty years later, Crown Mushrooms is now one of WA's largest locally owned mushroom farms employing almost 100 staff.

"I have seen sandy, non-existent tracks in the early years surrounding the Belgrade Road business become sealed roads. Over the years, the City of Wanneroo has provided the necessary infrastructure and services as required by our business," said Mr Johnson OAM.

"With today's mushroom farming so reliant on modern technologies, including computerised local area network and fibre-optic cabling, our Wanneroo location is ideal and our infrastructure needs, technical support and access to a large workforce are met locally. Additionally, the City's Planning unit has been a great help and have assisted our business in relation to Crown's rural resource zoning."

Peter Newbound, President of the Wanneroo Business Association said the Wanneroo Business Association enjoys a healthy working relationship with the City of Wanneroo to assist the business community in Wanneroo. Enterprise House is an important initiative for the region where businesses of all sizes can access a wide range of services and programs.

BUDGET FAQ'S

What do I get for my rates payment?

Rates comprise 57% of the 2008/09 Budget revenue and are invested in the recycling cart collection service, major capital works programs, environmental programs, libraries, parklands, recreation and community programs for the estimated 161,000 people who will reside in our City by 2011.

When will I receive my rates notices?

The rates notices will be mailed out in the week beginning 18 August 2008.

I just received a new yellow lid recycling cart. What impact does this have on my rates?

There is no longer a separate rubbish charge for the new yellow lid recycling cart. The standard rubbish charge that was previously a separate charge on your rates notice is now included in your general rates.

What does the standard rubbish charge provide me with?

The standard rubbish charge in your rates notice provides you with: 240 litre green lid rubbish cart (with weekly collection service) and a 240 litre yellow lid recycling cart (with fortnightly collection service).

I paid to be part of the Voluntary Recycling Cart Service and now free recycling carts have been delivered to all residents? Will I get some money back?

The City will credit a refund of \$20 per recycling cart on your rates notice for 2008/09 if you paid to be part of the City Voluntary Recycling Cart Service prior to 30 June 2008.

Why haven't I received my yellow lid recycling cart yet?

The City is delivering to ALL houses within the City of Wanneroo in a staged rollout that is almost complete. If you haven't received your cart please call the City on 9405 5200.

COMMUNITY FUNDING

Community funding is available to assist community organisations with projects and activities that contribute to the growth and enrichment of community life. It is available to not-for-profit, incorporated community organisations based in the City of Wanneroo or with a principal interest in the area.

The Mercy College Parent Council recently received Community Development funding for their Multicultural Food and Entertainment Festival. The funding assisted the group in providing entertainment and food for the event including international cuisines, activities and performances from around the world.

OPENING THE DOORS TO A REVITALISED TOWN CENTRE

WANNEROO AQUAMOTION

THIS YEAR YOU WILL BE ABLE TO ENJOY THE NEWLY UPGRADED WANNEROO AQUAMOTION THAT HAS BEEN TRANSFORMED INTO A FIRST CLASS FITNESS AND FAMILY ORIENTED LEISURE CENTRE.

New features include a gymnasium, fitness centre, plunge pool, deep pool, spa, sauna and children's splash pad with above ground spray and water features. Currently all pools have been poured and formed and tiling is in progress. Construction of the fitness centre is well advanced and gym equipment is on order.

The children's splash pad is complete, shade shelters are being erected, lighting is being installed and landscaping is in progress.

NORTH WARD **MARY LINDSAY HOMESTEAD**

THIS FINANCIAL YEAR THE CITY IS INVESTING \$100,000 INTO THE REFURBISHMENT OF THE CITY'S ICONIC MARY LINDSAY HOMESTEAD, LOCATED IN YANCHEP.

Built in the 1920's, the homestead was home to the Honourable Mary Janet Lindsay who was a well-known pioneer and played a vital role in the establishment of the Yanchep Estate.

The refurbishment of Mary Lindsay Homestead will involve asbestos removal from the building and surrounding area, the connection of electricity, water and sewage, landscaping and replacement of exterior walls, doors and window fittings to enable lock-up. A feasibility study into the use of the building as an arts and cultural centre will also be completed.

SOUTH WARD

KINGSWAY REGIONAL SPORTING COMPLEX

REDEVELOPMENTS AT KINGSWAY REGIONAL SPORTING COMPLEX WILL CONTINUE THIS FINANCIAL YEAR WITH THE CITY ALLOCATING A FURTHER \$3.2 MILLION TO COMMENCE STAGE THREE WORKS.

Over the coming months you will see the construction of the football, cricket, hockey and little athletics pitches, as well as the cricket & football carparks, internal roadworks and street lighting.

The stadium will also play host to a variety of sporting events over the next 12 months, including the Fencing WA Championships in August 2008 and the National Skating Championships in September 2008. Redevelopments will continue at Kingsway for the next four years, with all planned works due for completion in 2012.

COASTAL WARD **OCEAN DRIVE REDEVELOPMENT**

STAGE TWO CONSTRUCTION WORKS OF THE OCEAN DRIVE REDEVELOPMENT FROM ROBERT ROAD TO CAMIRA WAY ARE SCHEDULED TO START DURING THIS FINANCIAL YEAR WITH A FURTHER \$1 MILLION BEING ALLOCATED TO THE PROJECT.

Construction will continue in the same manner as stage one works that are nearing completion between Quinns Road and Robert Road. The works include the reconstruction of road pavement with a new asphalt surface, provision of stormwater drainage, kerbing, new pathways and street lighting.



IMPROVING REGIONAL INFRASTRUCTURE

THIS FINANCIAL YEAR THE CITY IS INVESTING MORE THAN \$20 MILLION ON THE BUILDING, UPGRADING AND REHABILITATION OF THE CITY'S ROADS.

Key projects include the \$6 million and \$5 million dual carriageway extensions of Mirrabooka Avenue and Hartman Drive, from Hepburn Avenue to Gngangara Road. \$4.7 million is also being spent to widen and extend Ocean Reef Road from Hartman Drive to Prestige Parade in Wangara, with future plans to fully extend Ocean Reef Road to Alexander Drive by 2010.

CENTRAL WARD

These road upgrades are part of a major infrastructure upgrade planned for the regional road network in Wanneroo. As WA's leading growth area, the amount of traffic on our roads will continue to increase and Council is committed to ensuring the timely provision of infrastructure to improve transport options and connections for the community.

WANNEROO LIBRARY AND CULTURAL CENTRE

CONSTRUCTION OF THE NEW 'STATE-OF-THE-ART' WANNEROO LIBRARY AND CULTURAL CENTRE WILL CONTINUE FOR THE MAJORITY OF THE YEAR WITH A FURTHER \$6.1 MILLION BEING ALLOCATED TO THE PROJECT IN THIS YEARS BUDGET.

Scheduled for completion in June 2009, the new facility will feature library services, a museum, touring exhibitions and community function space. The centre will also consist of a coffee shop, meeting space and will be home to various public displays including paintings, sculptures and library artwork.

THE CITY OF WANNEROO VALUES ITS NATURAL ASSETS AND IS COMMITTED TO WORKING TOWARDS BUILDING A SUSTAINABLE, NATURAL, BUILT AND HEALTHY ENVIRONMENT.

As WA's leading growth area, it is vital we ensure a balance between delivering new infrastructure and protecting the environment. The City continues to make significant investments into ongoing environmental initiatives that will secure the City's sustainable future.

Recently the City was awarded for its commitment to combating climate change through green purchasing and the completion of Milestones One and Two of the International Council for Local Environmental Initiatives (ICLEI) Water Campaign.

The City's Green Purchasing Action Plan is a policy that encourages staff to buy products and services that minimise negative

environmental impacts over their lifecycle. The ICLEI Water Campaign is an international freshwater management program that aims to build the capacity of local governments to reduce water consumption and improve local water quality.

Earlier this year, Council completed Milestone One of the Water Campaign with inventories being completed on Council's own scheme and groundwater usage and the community's scheme water usage. Priority areas were also identified where action will be taken to improve water quality.

The City has just completed Milestone Two of the Water Campaign and has committed to reducing scheme and groundwater consumption and improving water quality by 2014/15. The City is now working towards completing Milestone Three, which involves establishing a local action plan addressing current and future actions to save water and improve water quality.

Other City of Wanneroo environmental initiatives for 2008/09 include:

- + The City is working in partnership with Cedar Woods Properties Ltd to design and construct EcoVision Wanneroo; a demonstration project that will showcase affordable and sustainable house designs and practices for people to implement in their own homes.
- + Update the Local Environmental Strategy, which has been reviewed to identify the current major environmental pressures facing our region and provide a strategic framework and specific environmental management actions to respond to them.
- + Approve and implement a Local Biodiversity Strategy which outlines the ways in which Council will plan for the City's expected growth while minimising loss of natural areas and maintaining local biodiversity.

CLOSURE TO MOBILE LIBRARY SERVICE

THE CITY'S MOBILE LIBRARY SERVICE WILL CEASE AND CLOSE OPERATIONS FROM OCTOBER 2008.

Despite this closure, council is committed to improving the facilities of the City's libraries through the allocation of \$35,000 in this year's budget to upgrade the building and services at the Yanchepp/Two Rocks Library.

The upgrades will include an additional 10,000 books, an improved children's reading area, extended hours and overall enhancement of the current service areas and facilities.

The upgrades are expected to commence this October and be completed by November 2008. The City has also invested a further \$6.1 million this financial year for the construction of the new 'state-of-the-art' Wanneroo Library and Cultural Centre.

"The City understands the value of literacy and the importance of having a high quality library service which caters for the needs of our growing community. Investing money into not only the Yanchepp/Two Rocks Library but also the new Wanneroo Library and Cultural Centre is a prime example of our commitment to creating distinct and vibrant communities."

SAFER PATHWAYS

THE CITY OF WANNEROO VALUES COMMUNITY SAFETY AND IS COMMITTED TO ENSURING OUR REGIONAL INFRASTRUCTURE PROVIDES FOR SAFE PEDESTRIAN MOVEMENTS.

Last year Council invested more than \$400,000 for the provision of new footpath networks and to upgrade and replace paths that were in disrepair.

This financial year the City is investing a further \$500,000 into the provision of new footpath networks in the following locations that will continue to help improve community safety.

RECYCLING FOR A GREENER FUTURE

COUNCIL RECENTLY UPGRADED THE CITY'S MIXED BAG RECYCLING SERVICE AND PROVIDED ALL RESIDENTS WITH FREE UNIVERSAL RECYCLING CARTS.

Residents now have the opportunity to recycle an increased range of products such as mixed papers and plastics, while making a valuable contribution towards saving energy and protecting the environment.

"Recycling our used products will help us to create a sustainable and healthy City for future generations to enjoy." Mayor Jon Kelly said.

WORKING TOGETHER TO UTILISE RESOURCES

IN 2007/08 COUNCIL UPGRADED THE WANGARA MATERIALS RECOVERY CENTRE TO ALLOW FOR GREATER RECYCLING CAPACITY IN THE COMMUNITY.

The new facility now has four times the hourly capacity of the previous centre and can process an increased range of recyclable products such as mixed plastic bottles and paper products like junk mail and office paper.

The construction of the new facility was the result of a joint funded project between the Cities of Wanneroo, Joondalup and Swan. The new centre will allow for increased recovery of recyclable material within our combined regions and minimise the amount of waste ending up in landfill. Collaboratively we are ensuring the timely provision of infrastructure to meet our growing communities evolving needs and expectations.

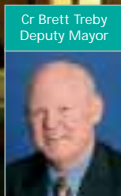

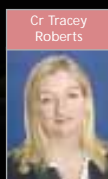

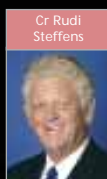
