TENDER 23105 - PROVISION OF MECHANICAL AND HVAC SERVICES

Issue

To consider Tender No: 23105, for Provision of Mechanical and HVAC Services for an initial contract term of 3 years with two (2) x 12-month options to extend at the City's discretion.

Background

Mechanical and HVAC Services are currently provided by Australian Airconditioning Services under contract 18060 and is due to expire on 30 June 2023.

Following a review of the City's requirements, it is proposed that a new contract be awarded for an initial period of three (3) years with two (2) x 12-month, or part thereof, extension options. This is intended to provide both budgetary and operational stability over the contract duration.

Detail

Tender 23105 was advertised on 3 May 2023 and closed on 19 May 2023. There were two (2) Addenda issued in response to bidder clarifications sought and which did not change the intent or scope of work included to the original tender document.

All tenderers must meet the City's minimum requirements (as determined by the City) for each of the qualitative criteria detailed above (*) in order to be considered for further evaluation.

Pricing is not included in the qualitative criteria and is considered as part of the overall value for money assessment.

All received tenders were accepted on the basis that they were compliant and worthy of inclusion to the tender evaluation process.

Evaluation Criteria 1 - Sustainable Procurement (20%)

Evidence of Sustainable (Corporate Social Responsibility) Procurement was assessed based on the Tenderer's responses provided to the Questionnaires within Schedules 3A, 38, 3C and 3D which formed part of the tender documentation.

Sub Criteria a) Environmental Considerations (5%)

The City is committed to procuring goods and services that provide positive environmental, social and economic impacts over the entire life cycle of a product or service. Respondents are encouraged to provide credentials of any environmental claims of the goods and/or services submitted in this tender.

- RESPECT recognising the contribution of Indigenous people to Australia and learning more about the history, culture and diversity in a two-way communication process;
- OPPORTUNITIES attracting, developing and retaining organisational talent to build opportunities for aboriginal employment, training, and development and mentoring.

- People with disabilities receiving the same level and quality of service from staff as other people receive;
- People with disabilities having the same opportunities as other people to make complaints;
- People with disabilities having the same opportunities as other people to participate in any employment opportunities.

Assessment of this criterion also considered the tenderer's proposed methodology along with available staff resources, vehicles, plant/equipment and workshop support to manage the contract.

Value for Money Assessment

A calculation based on the City's estimated requirement for items within the submitted schedule of rates was used to determine an equitable projected cost over the initial three (3) year contract period for each tenderer. Further detail is contained within the attached Confidential Memorandum.

Overall Assessment and Comment

Australian Airconditioning Services were ranked highest in three of the four individual Qualitative Criteria resulting in their being ranked highest in the Overall Qualitative Weighting Assessment. They also ranked best for Pricing for the Goods/Services assessment and therefore satisfied the overall value for money assessment in accordance with the assessment criteria and weightings as detailed in the Procurement and Evaluation Plan.

Australian Airconditioning Services' submission is assessed as having suitable safety systems, experience, resources, capacity and a proven methodology to carry out the requirements of the contract and is therefore recommended as the successful tenderer.

Enterprise Risk Management Considerations

Financial and Performance Risk

Financial Risk

A financial risk assessment was undertaken as part of the evaluation process and the outcome of this independent assessment advised that Australian Airconditioning Services has been assessed with a 'strong' financial capacity to meet the requirements of the relevant contract.

The financial risk is further mitigated by the contract conditions which provide for payment to be made only after satisfactory completion of services.

Performance Risk

Australian Airconditioning Services is the City's incumbent contractor for this service and has previously demonstrated it has the capacity and experience to fulfil the contract requirements. It is considered reliable and produces work to a high standard while maintaining alignment to budget and scheduling requirements without dispute or incident.

Policy Implications

Tenders were invited in accordance with the requirements of the City's Purchasing Policy.

Financial (Budget) Implications

The cost associated with the Provision of Mechanical and HVAC Services is included in the Asset Maintenance Operational Budget.

Recommendation:

That the Chief Executive Officer, in accordance with Delegation 1.1.13 -Choice of Most Advantageous Tender of the Delegated Authority Register for the awarding of tenders ACCEPTS the tender submitted by Australian Airconditioning Services Pty Ltd for Tender 23105, for the PROVISION OF MECHANICAL AND HVAC SERVICES, as per the schedule of rates in the tender submission, for a period of three (3) years with two (2) twelve (12) month, or part thereof, options to extend at the discretion of the City, subject to appropriate funding availability for the 12-month contract term and subsequent approved contract extensions.
