


Wanneroo – A Diverse Area

Introduction

The City of Wanneroo (the City) is an expanding outer metropolitan local government on the northern fringe of the Perth area, located 12km from the Perth CBD at its nearest point. The City is the fastest growing local government area in Western Australia and the fifth fastest growing in Australia, with Perth's next major Strategic Metropolitan Centre at Yanchep currently being developed.

The City covers an area of 684km², has 32 kilometres of coastline and is made up of 36 suburbs. Our community choose to live and work here for the lifestyle available to them – from coastal plains to wetlands; from market gardens to residential homes; from bushland to urban development and industrial areas.

The City's suburbs are within the State's North Metropolitan Region electoral district and within the Commonwealth electorates of Pearce, Cowan and Moore.








Dwellings growth (20 yrs) – 76,434 to 135,725 Population growth (20 yrs) – 216,435 to 367,775

2023/24 RATES OVERVIEW






City of Wanneroo 2023-24 Statutory Budget - City of Wanneroo

Annual Budget - Operating Income (\$226.6M)



Annual Budget - Operating Expenses (\$228.7M)



Annual Budget - Capital Expenses (\$64.1M) - Excluding Carry Forwards (\$16.4M)




<u>City of Wanneroo - 2023-24 Capital Works Program - City of Wanneroo</u>

Governance and Legal Councillor Conduct



Local Government (Model Code of Conduct) Regulations 2021

The Local Government Act 1995 requires that local governments adopt the Model Code as their Code of Conduct until such time as the local government adopts its own Code.

The City of Wanneroo adopted the <u>Council Member</u>, <u>Committee Member</u> and <u>Candidate Code of Conduct</u> on 20 April 2021.

Division 2 of the Code refer to general principles that outline the overarching approach that members and candidates should demonstrate in their role as public representatives, or potential public representatives.

Individuals should consider all behaviours in light of these principles, including any behaviour and conduct that is not covered specifically in Division 3 and 4.

Local Government Act 1995

- Serious Breach and Criminal Offences: A serious breach is committed by a council member against a written law when the person is acting in their capacity as a council member and include matters such as failing to vote at a Council meeting or breaching confidentiality.
- Reportable to the Corruption and Crime Commission and/or the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries
